LATEST Information for those travelling abroad over Christmas and regarding the new self-isolation periods

You may well have picked up the news this afternoon that the self-isolation period is being reduced from 14 to 10 days from Monday. This will mean that any bubbles closing will now only close for 10 days rather than 14. This will also apply to those quarantining after travel abroad. I'm aware that some of you are taking holiday abroad during the Christmas holiday, and this will relate to you. I've previously mentioned the Test to release for international travel; the scheme whereby people can take a test after 5 days from leaving their travel destination and then return to work/school if that test is negative. This change would now reduce the quarantine period from 10 days to around 7 days once the results arrive. It remains the case that these tests still need to be privately arranged tests and cannot be NHS Track and Trace tests (which are not permitted to be used for this purpose). The cost of these tests is over £100 each in almost all cases, and

many are not allowed to be used on children. If you do follow the procedures (<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-test-to-release-for-international-travel>) to take these tests then please inform the school on your arrival back into the UK of this, so we can arrange for your children coming back in on the correct day. If you are needing to quarantine your children for any period that falls in term time please notify us and we will authorise that absence.

Year 2

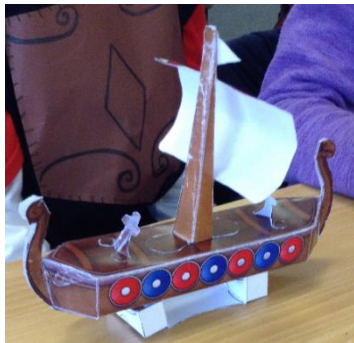
Year 2 have had a really busy final week and are sad to be saying goodbye to their pirate topic. This week's learning focus has been as follows: English - The children have worked really hard on completing their own pirate stories remembering to think about the structure of the story mountain (introduction, problems, resolutions and ending).

Maths - Children have enjoyed playing pirate games that involve coordinates. DT - All week the children have been busy finishing off constructing their pirate ships. This has involved the children using cutting, measuring and teamwork skills. I'm sure you'll agree that the results of all their hard work are really impressive. Below is a picture of the fleet for you to look at before it sails off to the Caribbean with Captain Goller for a Christmas break. Reading - This week we have enjoyed listening to 'Jolly Rodger' by Collin Naughton. Thank you for all your support with the children's learning over the term. Have a safe and relaxing break.



Year 3

Year 3 have had another hardworking week, filled with lots of festive and topical activities to celebrate and mark the end of the autumn term. On Monday, Years 3 and 4 had 'Invaders Day' and everyone from both classes, including teachers dressed up as Celts, Romans, Anglo-Saxons or Vikings. Year 3 spent the day creating 3-D Longships (see picture below), axes and shields. The class also learnt some Viking songs and famous sagas. We ended the day by weaving using a variety of different coloured wool. The day was enjoyed by both year groups and Mrs Palmer and I were very impressed with the huge effort that had gone into the children's costumes and their enthusiasm around this topic.



We have also spent the week recapping fractions and learning how to work out fractions of amounts, including money. We concluded Maths this week by learning about right angles. The class had to work out which 2-D shapes contained right angles and which did not.

On Wednesday, Year 3 enjoyed singing *Jingle Bells* in front of the whole school, in the playground as part of the winter music assembly organised by Mrs Onatskaia. They also enjoyed listening to Reception, Year 1 and 2 singing songs from their filmed winter production and Years 5 and 6 singing *Jingle Bell Rock*. After the singing, the class really enjoyed their Christmas lunch, particularly the chocolate yule log. We ended the week by completing our Anglo-Saxon villages. The class worked in groups of 3 or 4 and used additional cardboard to create a base for their villages which was then painted green, some included a bit of blue to represent a nearby river. Year 3 placed their previously decorated houses onto the villages and used playdough, pipe cleaners, tissue paper, feathers and lolly pop sticks to create people, animals, vegetation and fences (see attached pictures). Overall, Mrs D'Oyly and I have been very impressed with the Year 3s hard work, perseverance and resilience this term. Well done all of you! Have an excellent and restful Christmas break Year 3.

Year 4

We celebrated the end of our Invaders topic with some dressing up and the attention to detail in the children's costumes was amazing. Thank you for supporting your children with this important part of their education. We enjoyed practising for our class singing performance (with Year 3) of *Jingle Bells*, with some of us enjoying singing in small groups in front of the class. Well done to those people who took the challenge! Wishing all Year 4 families a happy, healthy and restful holiday.

Year 5

In Maths, Year 5 have been looking at co-ordinates and plotting points in the first quadrant and then presenting the data from our science investigation in a bar chart. We had a last round of netball matches in PE, and presented a summary of our learning about WW2 in a variety of forms (poems, drawings, graphic novels, etc). Later this week we celebrated VE day together with Year 6 in the hall. We listened to Winston Churchill's speech marking Victory in Europe, heard poems and speeches, watched a short skit and finished off by dancing to 1940s music and eating Spam and jam sandwiches.
