Classroom Round-up:

Reception

We have been really challenging ourselves in Maths this week, with the children taking turns to be 'Maths Machines'. The children were able to choose the maths operation they wanted to carry out and answer questions. So, for example, one child told the class that they were a doubling machine and then the class could ask them doubling questions. Some were halving machines, others could count in 10s and yet others could count backwards and forwards. No batteries were needed to operate the machines! We have also been continuing to write our own minibeast stories and will be finishing this next week so you can enjoy them at home.

Reception/Year 1

It has been a very enjoyable week in R/1 which started with forest school. The class went on an investigation to find out how many different creatures live in the forest school area, and created some inviting shelters for any passing hedgehogs. In English, we have been thinking ahead to next year with our future teachers. Each of us wrote a letter to next year's teacher asking them a question about their class and detailing something that they would like to learn about next year. In Maths we have been learning about a variety of time words (now, later, before, after, first, etc) and how we can use them accurately. Keep an eye out to see if you notice any time words during your weekend. Finally, as a reward for achieving all of our 'smiley faces', the class have requested that we dress up on our final day, so R/1 will be having a dress-up day on Thursday. Have a fantastic weekend!

Year 1

This week in Year 1 we have been finishing off our fact sheets on animals and trying to apply our neatest handwriting, as we are going to turn them into a class book. We have been doing investigations in Maths using coins. We are still working on plurals and the prefix 'un' in Phonics. In Art we have used pastels to draw a portrait of a male lion. On Thursday we had a fabulous trip to Shepreth Wildlife Park and the children amazed the staff with their knowledge of animals.



Year 2

Year 2 have had a great week and had lots of fun dressing up as dragons, knights and princesses on Thursday. In History the children learnt about what a Medieval banquet might have looked like. They designed their own menus based on the foods that might have been served at the time and compared them to a children's party menu in 2021. In English the children have continued to really impress with the story language they have used when writing their own dragon stories. In Maths the class have focused on problem solving and investigations involving number. In PHSE the children learnt about the names of different parts of the body for both boys and girls. In PE we continued to work on the activities that will be part of our Sports Day on Monday.

Year 3


Well done Year 3 for a great penultimate week at school. On Monday, the class had Forest Schools and we spent the day building dens and roasting marshmallows over a fire. Mrs Bicknell, Ms D'Oyly and I were really impressed with how well the class worked together to build their dens. Each group worked as a team to collect sticks and branches and then place a tarpaulin over the top to construct their own personalised dens. Thank you Mrs Bicknell for a wonderful session. In English this week, we have been reading Roald Dahl's, George's Marvellous Medicine and the class wrote their own narratives based on a picture inspired by the book. One child wrote about how they had been transformed into a magical cat. In SPAG, we have been exploring the -ure suffix and the class discovered words such as 'pressure' and 'leisure.' In Maths, Year 3 have been revising time and they were exploring word problems and a few challenges which included start and end times of trains. In Computing, the class have been working on Scratch to create a story and some even turned their research of a European country into a PowerPoint presentation. In Design and Technology, Year 3 have painted and decorated their Norfolk Coast models.




In PE, the class have been practising their sporting activities for Sport's Day. Well done for a fantastic week Year 3!

Year 4

In Science, we researched information on habitat loss and environmental impact for a report we are writing. In Maths, we completed a coordinates challenge and learnt about different kinds of triangles (scalene, equilateral and isoceles). In English, we practised using paragraphs in fiction (new speaker, new line, new paragraph) and continued reading and discussing *The Iron Man*. In PSHE, we talked about why some basic personal hygiene routines are relevant. We have been working on a DT project (sewing flags of European countries on binca canvas) connected to our Topic. Everyone is concentrating very hard on improving their sewing skills. We have also been busy with P.E this week including rounders with Mr Pinnock and athletics with Mr West.





Year 5

It has been a week of percentages in Maths, finding ten percent (and therefore any other multiple of 10%). In Geography, we had a discussion about boundaries and borders (which encompassed finding out a little about communism), and then worked together to divide up a landmass, deciding whether the borders should run between religious groups, language regions or the geology of the land. Towards the end of the week, we looked at modal verbs and how they're used in advertising. In PSHE we looked at the physical and emotional changes girls and boys go through during puberty.

Year 6

This week has been dominated by editing scripts, preparing props, working on dances, speaking more slowly, speaking more clearly, speaking more loudly and practicing, practicing, practicing. Luckily, all the work came together on the Thursday evening, and we put together a very enjoyable evening's entertainment. Our Friday has been spent designing and implementing a business project, which has been brilliant.
