Classroom news

Reception

Reception has had a fantastic full week! The children have been introduced to their new book, The Gigantic Turnip. They discussed the events in the story and acted it out in groups. In Phonics, the children explored CCVC words such as crack, and CCCVC words such as sprain, strain, and screen. In maths, they investigated all the number combinations that make up 5 and 6. They wrote these as addition number sentences, such as 2 + 3 = 5, and learnt that when you reverse the sentence, it still makes sense – for example, 5 = 3+ 2. In science, we talked more about the importance of looking after our teeth. During Topic, everyone created a healthy eating plate, filled with a variety of nutritious foods. We ended our week with Forest School, where we listened to the wonderful sounds of early summer and spotted the seasonal changes in nature. Well done for a great week, Reception!

Year 1

In P.E. Year 1 has been focussing on ball skills. Following a few sessions on rolling, throwing and catching balls, this week we have been developing ball bouncing skills. The children were asked to follow the guidance for knowing how to bounce a ball. You might think it's easy, but there is a lot of coordination involved: 1. Hold the ball at chest height 2. Focus on the spot where you want the ball to bounce 3. Push the ball down to that spot using the correct amount of force 4. Track the ball with your eyes as the ball bounces up 5. Use both hands to catch the ball around waist height as it bounces back up to you. Hopefully, Year 1 will have lots of fun bouncing balls over the weekend!

Year 2

This week in history, we have been learning about Florence Nightingale and why she was significant. In English we also explored word definitions, used *-ly* to turn adjectives into adverbs and created our own superheroes and villains, describing them with expanded noun phrases. In maths, we continued our work on multiplication and division, focussing on the relationship between the two through inverse operations. In science, we explored the life cycles of different animals and learned about metamorphosis. In DT, we designed menus using our knowledge of a balanced diet. In computing, we revisited Scratch, writing short programs and experimenting with changing sprites and backgrounds before running them. Well done for a fantastic week Year 2!

Year 3

Year 3 has worked really hard throughout the week. In our maths lessons, the children worked on their understanding of fractions. They compared them and placed them along a number line. In English lessons, they started to understand

what makes a good advert. The children enioved creating a persuasive script for a chosen product and presenting it to the class. In our science session, we started to plan an investigation about whether or not the size of your hand affects vour grip strength. The children enjoyed starting to think about what they wanted to find out in their child led projects and how they wished to present their ideas.

Year 4

We have had a fantastic week in Year 4. In maths, we have started our fraction unit, looking at fraction and decimal equivalents. In English, we have continued to study *The Iron Man*. This week, we looked at conjunctions, and their impact in creative writing. In French, we had a go at making a triarama, in which children drew a variety of shops, including French vocabulary on their work. This week's spellings are adverbs/words ending in ly. Have a great weekend.

Year 5

In English, we revised modal verbs and adverbs of possibility and explored how this can change the level of certainty in invitation letters. We also practised writing polite refusal RSVPs to invitations. In maths, we read various travel timetables (including trains with different arrival/departure times at the same stop) and calculated which route is fastest, which route would be most suitable to ensure punctuality and what time our train would arrive in the event of a delay. In science we looked at the properties of different materials and discussed which would be most suitable for different purposes. In PSHE, we talked about which words for female/male body parts are appropriate for use in school and why some words are considered taboo.

Year 6

Some of Year 6 took part in an athletics tournament. There was a 600m run, 75m sprint, long jump and howler. The people that did not go to the athletics tournament made a healthy poster about the body and they practised the play and printed the play booklets. Ms Noble gave us 3 stars so now we have 98 ½. It was a wonderful week and we can't wait until the next one.
